Program Highlights

Forest Health Protection

In 2018, Vermont became the 32nd state infested by emerald ash borer with infested trees found in several areas of the state. Forest tent caterpillar defoliation expanded again, with 71,315 acres mapped during aerial surveys. White pine needle damage more than doubled in area in 2018 compared to 2017, with 40,745 acres mapped.

Forest Stewardship

The Vermont Forest Stewardship Program reported 134 new or revised stewardship plans for 40,551 acres of which 30,149 acres were in Important Forest Areas per Vermont's Strategic Forest Action Plan; 1,429 landowners participated in education programs; and several landscape scale restoration projects including one with the Vermont Natural Resources Council, titled "Training Real Estate and Resource Professionals to Keep Forests as Forests" - a LaSR project targeting professionals who work with private landowners making decisions about their woodlands.
